Great Lenten Period: Food for the Soul

On Monday, March the 2nd, the Orthodox Church will begin the day in which we call Clean Monday. This is a beginning of a spiritual journey and an experience of renewal, which will bring us to the end of our journey, when we celebrate the feast of feast "The Resurrection" of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, "Holy Pasha".

In John14:16 it states, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life, no one comes to the father, but by me." This is a very deep theological statement, the Lord loves us all. It is truly a wonderful truth that His love for us is filled with His goodness and mercy. Through the grace of the Holy Spirit, who is ever present with us, our soul finds peace knowing how much goodness and mercy is offered to us because of the love our God.

That's why in John 4:24 it states, "God is spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth." If we truly worship our Lord, then we must have purity of heart. If we do this, then we will bring forth good fruit with honesty and love. The Lenten period is a time in our lives that we invite the change of our lifestyle in preparation for Pasha! Like anything else in life, the more we understand what is happening around us the more we will experience God's healing and compassion in our lives.

What we need to do during this Lenten period is to focus on our spiritual responsibilities. Why I stated that is because we as humans we tend to do things and accept things that really God does not approve of. I will give you an example, during the Great Lenten period we have a great Liturgical cycle within our Church. As a family, we need to decide on what our Church service schedule will be during Lent. Which means that we must make a few sacrifices in order to accomplish the journey that is ahead of us.

Many of our families are indulged in sports. For example soccer, baseball, etc. we look ahead to commit our evenings and weekends to the sport schedule. We always use the excuse that the coach demands it, or without my son or daughter

the team will not be competitive. We do this for earthly rewards and pleasure. If you plan your week in advance, knowing that you will attend the Wednesday night Pre-Sanctified Liturgies, or Friday night the Salutations of the Virgin Mary, or Sunday Services is a commitment towards heavenly rewards of peace and healing. The most effective way to teach our children the joy of the liturgical life of the Church is to embrace it in our own lives.

We have children and adults in our Parish that never attended a Compline Service, a Pre-Sanctified Service, a Salutation Service. Some of our children have never entered the Church since the time they were baptized. We have married couples that from the time of their marriage have never stepped back into Church. We have married couples that baptize their children and never return until the child is eligible for the Sunday School program. Is this really showing God how much we care and love Him? Is this what we want for our children? When Christ said: "Imitate me!" How can the children imitate Christ when they do not ever know Him?

So, in closing for us this is a forty day journey to the light of Holy Pasha, for the Feast of the Resurrection of Christ is not simply a great feast or even the greatest of all feasts of the Church year, but is the very essence and love of our faith. The Apostle Paul says that "If Christ did not rise, then our faith is in vain." 1 Cor.15:14.

Therefore as faithful Orthodox Christians, we should learn to know about our God and His great love for us all. Know the love of Christ, and live with peace in your soul, because in the end we behold not only His goodness and mercy, but also His meekness and gentleness.

So, during this Lenten Season let's turn to God in prayer, and learn more about Him through the beautiful services that our Church offers us. If we do not and follow these examples then we are truly on the pathway towards our Salvation. What a blessing that is for us all.

Η χάρη του Αγίου Πνεύματος, όταν παρουσιάζεται σε μας, η ψυχή μας βρίσκει γαλήνη γνωρίζοντας τη γαλήνη και ευσπλαχνία που μας προσφέρει χάρις στην αγάπη του Θεού.

Ο Ιωάννης στο 4:24 αναφέρει «ο Θεός είναι Πνεύμα, και εκείνοι που Τον λατρεύουν τελετουργικά, πρέπει να Τον λατρεύουν πνευματικά και αληθινά.» Αν πραγματικά λατρεύουμε το Κύριο, τότε πρέπει να έχουμε αγνότητα στη καρδιά. Αν το κάνουμε, τότε θα αποφέρουμε καρπούς τιμιότητας και αγάπης.

Η περίοδος της Σαραχοστής είναι η περίοδος της ζωής μας που μας καλεί να αλλάξουμε τρόπο ζωής και να

προετοιμαστούμε κατάλληλα για το Πάσχα. Όπως ζωή, οτιδήποτε άλλο στη όσο πεοισσότεοο αντιλαμβανόμαστε τι συμβαίνει γύρω μας, τόσο περισσότερο έχουμε την εμπειρία, να καταλάβουμε την θεραπεία και φιλεσπλαχνία του Θεού στη ζωή μας. Ο λόγος που το ανέφερα είναι γιατί εμείς, ως άνθρωποι, τείνουμε να κάνουμε πράγματα και να δεχθούμε καταστάσεις που πραγματικά δεν εγκρίνονται από τον Θεό. Θα σας δώσω ένα παράδειγμα, κατά τη διάρκεια της Μεγάλης Τεσσαρακοστής, η Εκκλησία μας προσφέρει ένα μεγάλο Λειτουργικό Κύκλο. Σαν οικογένεια πρέπει να αποφασίσουμε ποιες Ακολουθίες θα παρακολουθήσουμε, που σημαίνει ότι πρέπει να κάνουμε μερικές θυσίες για να φθάσουμε επαξίως στο τέρμα του ταξιδιού που θα κάνουμε.

Μερικές από τις οικογένειες μας συμμετέχουν σε σπόστς. Για παράδειγμα, ποδόσφαιρο, μπέιζμπωλ, μπάσκετ κ.λ.π. Προβλέπουν και κλείνουν κάποια βράδυα τους και σαββατοκύριακά τους για το πρόγραμμα του σπορ. Πάντα το ρείχνουν ότι το απαιτεί ο προπονητής, ή χωρίς τη συμμετοχή του παιδιού τους, γιός ή κόρη, η ομάδα δεν μπορεί να αναμετρηθεί.

Προγραμματίζουμε ευχαρίστως για επήγεια οφέλη και διασκεδάσεις. Ας προγραμματίσουμε εκ των προτέρων λοιπόν, γνωρίζοντας ότι θα πάμε στην εκκλησία τις Τετάρτες το βράδυ για τις Προηγιασμένες Θείες Λειτουργίες

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The Sunday Scripture Lessons of Great Lent, Part I

Most of the Sundays of Great Lent have acquired throughout the historical development of the Church secondary themes and meanings which are independent of the primary Lenten spiritual lessons expressed in the Epistle and Gospel readings for those days. Some of the secondary themes attached to these Sundays commemorate important events in the Church's history such as Orthodoxy's victory over Iconoclasm and the restoration of the veneration of icons in 843 (1st Sunday of Lent) and the 14th century vindication of the theology of St. Gregory Palamas (2nd Sunday). Others highlight two great masters of ascetic struggle and the spiritual life, St. John Climacus (4th Sunday) and St. Mary of Egypt (5th Sunday), who serve as role models for the faithful during the Lenten fast.

However, the principle doctrinal and spiritual lessons that the church intends to teach us during this intense period of fasting and prayer is found in the Scripture readings for the five Sundays of Lent. A brief examination of these readings is instructive in discerning the Church's message as it guides us on our journey to experience the Lord's Passion, Death and glorious Resurrection.

Perhaps the best context in which to view the instructional sequence in these Lenten Sunday Epistles and Gospel readings is to remember that originally in the early Church Lent was an extended period of preparation for the catechumens, those wishing to be newly baptized into the faith. Their baptism occurred at the Paschal liturgy. The Scripture lessons of Lent explained to them the meaning of the momentous event that was to take place in their lives and prepared them for their personal identification with Christ's Death and Resurrection in the baptismal waters. The content of these lessons continues to have profound relevance for us today as each Easter we return to and reawaken the meaning and promise of our own Baptisms.

The theme of the Scripture lessons for the 1st Sunday of Lent centers around God's promise to ultimately redeem mankind and highlights those who through unwavering faith, often associated with great suffering, wait upon and ultimately receive the fulfillment of that promise. The day's Epistle (Heb.11: 24-26, 32-40, 12: 2) catalogs the trials of the righteous men and

women of the Old Testament who, though faithful to God, did not experience the realization of God's promise. It concludes that God has foreseen "something better for us"; that is, for those of us privileged to live during and after the Lord's coming. That something is proclaimed in the Gospel lesson that follows (John 1: 43-51). We are told that those who truly believe will see the manifestation of God's Kingdom, "heaven open" and "the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man".

This promise belongs to all who with sincere hearts and obedient faith trust and serve Christ. We are cautioned, however, in the Epistle read on the 2^{nd} Sunday of Lent (Heb. 1:10-2:3), as were the first catechumens, that we must remain steadfast in our faith so that we do not "drift away" and "neglect so great a salvation". As an example of just such an unshakable faith, the Gospel for the day (Mark 2:1-12) recounts the story of the men who lowered the paralytic through a roof to receive forgiveness of sins and healing from Jesus. The clear message is that God rewards determined and courageous faith.

The Scripture readings of the 3^{rd} Sunday, the Veneration of The Cross, remind us this kind of faith will entail sacrifice and suffering. On this Sunday, the Life Giving Cross makes Its appearance and the meaning of Christ's offering of Himself for us and our identification with His sacrifice begins to unfold. The Epistle (Heb. 4:14-5:6) explains that the Lord is our great and merciful High Priest who offered Himself on the Cross for our sins so that we may "come boldly to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy". The Gospel that follows (March 8:34-9:1) explains the meaning of the Cross in the life of the believer. We are exhorted by our Savior to take up our cross and follow Him. As true believers, we must willingly reject sin and accept self-denial and suffering as symbolized by the Cross, for Christ's sake and the advancement of the Gospel.

The Church wisely offers the example and adoration of the Cross in mid-Lent to strengthen and encourage the faithful during their struggles as they take up their own crosses during Great Lent. The emphasis on Christ's humility and suffering on the Cross for our sakes is intended to enable us to redirect and rededicate our lives to God and seek fulfillment of our lives in communion and union with Him.

THE ANNUNCIATION OF THE THEOTOKOS MARCH 25TH

Six months after John the Forerunner's conception, God sent the Archangel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town of Galilee, unto Mary the Virgin, who had come forth from the Temple a mature maiden (see Nov. 21). According to the tradition handed down by the Fa-



thers, she had been betrothed to Joseph four months. On coming to Joseph's house, the Archangel declared: "Rejoice, thou Full of Grace, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women."

After some consideration, and turmoil of soul, and fear because of this greeting, the Virgin, when she had finally obtained full assurance concerning God's unsearchable condescension and the ineffable dispensation that was to take place through her, and believing that all things are possible to the Most High, answered in humility: "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word." And

at this, the Holy Spirit came upon her, and the power of the Most high overshadowed her all-blameless womb, and the Son and Word of God, Who existed before the ages, was conceived past speech and understanding, and became flesh in her immaculate body (Luke 1:26-38).

Bearing in her womb the Uncontainable One, the blessed Virgin went with haste from Nazareth to the hill country of Judea, where Zechariahs had his dwelling; for she desired to find Elizabeth her kinswoman and rejoice together with her, because, as she had learned from the Archangel, Elizabeth had conceived in her old age. Furthermore, she wished to tell her of the great things that the Mighty One had been well-pleased to bring to pass in her, and she greeted Elizabeth and drew nigh to her. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, she felt her six-month-old babe, Saint John the Baptist, prophesied of the dawning of the spiritual Sun. Immediately, the aged Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and recognized her as the Mother of her Lord, and with a great voice blessed her and the Fruit that she held within herself. The Virgin also, moved by a supernatural rejoicing in the spirit, glorified her God and Savior, saying: "My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour," and the rest, as the divine Luke hath recorded (1:39-55)

Apolytikion in the Fourth Tone

Today marks the crowning of our salvation and the revelation of the mystery before all ages. For the Son of God becomes the son of the Virgin, and Gabriel proclaims the grace. Wherefore, we also cry out with him, "Hail, O full of grace, the Lord is with you."

Kontakion in the Plagal of the Fourth Tone

To you, Theotokos, invincible Defender, having been delivered from peril, I, your city, dedicate the victory festival as a thank offering. In your irresistible might, keep me safe from all trials, that I may call out to you: "Hail, unwedded bride!"

ή τις Παρασμευές το βράδυ για τους Χαιρετισμούς της Παρθένου, ή την Κυριαχή για τις Θείες Λειτουργίες, που είναι υποσχέσεις με πνευματικά οφέλη, ειρήνης και θεραπείας. Ο πιο ουσιαστικός τρόπος να δειδάξουμε και μυήσουμε τα παιδιά μας στη λειτουργική ζωή της εκκλησίας, είναι να την αποδεχθούμε πρόθυμα στη δική μας ζωή. Έχουμε στη Κοινότητά μας ενήλικες και παιδιά που ποτέ δεν παρακολούθησαν την Ακκολουθία του Απόδειπνου, ή Προηγιαμένη Θεία Λειτουργία, ή Χαιρετισμούς της Παναγίας.

Μερικα παιδιά μας δεν έχουν ξανάρθει στην εκκλησία από τότε που βαπτίστημαν. Έχουμε τελέσει γάμους παιδιών μας που από τότε δεν έχουν ξαναπατήσει στην εκκλησία. Έχουμε παντρέψει ζευγάρια που βάπτισαν τα παιδιά τους και δεν τα ξανάδαμε μέχρι που τα παιδιά τους ήλθαν σε ηλικία για το Κατηχητικό Σχολείο. Είναι αυτές πράξεις που πραγματικά δείχνουν στο Θεό πόσο Τον αγαπούμε και Τον φροντίζουμε? Αυτό θέλουμε για τα παιδιά μας? Όταν είπε ο Χριστός «Μιμηθείτε με,» Ποιον να μιμηθούν τα παιδιά όταν δεν Τον γνωρίζουν!

Κλείνοντας, για μας οι σαράντα ημέρες του ταξιδιού που έρχεται είναι ο Φάρος φωτός για το Πάσχα, για την εορτή της Ανάστασης του Χριστού, που δεν είναι μόνον απλά η μεγαλύτερη εορτή όλων των εορτών του εκκλησιαστικού έτους, αλλά είναι ο ουσιώδης πυρήνας της Πίστης μας. Ο Απόστολος Παύλος λέγει «Αν ο Χριστός δεν αναστηνόταν, τότε η Πίστη μας θα ήταν μάταιη.» 1 προς Κορινθ.15-14.

Γι' αυτό, σαν Ορθόδοξοι Χριστιανοί θα πρέπει να μάθουμε να γνωρίζουμε το Θεό μας και τη μαγαλοσύνη της αγάπης Του για όλους εμάς. Να γνωρίζουμε την αγάπη του Χριστού, και να ζήσουμε με ειρήνη στην ψυχή μας, διότι στο τέλος δεν θα δούμε μόνον την καλοσύνη και την ευσπλαχνία Του, αλλά την πραότητα και ευγένεια Του.

Έτσι, κατά τη διάρκεια αυτής της Περιόδου Νηστείας, ας στραφούμε προς το Θεό με προσευχή, και ας Τον πλησιάσουμε περισσότερο, ερχόμενοι στις ωραιότατες Ακολουθίες που μας προσφέρει η εκκλησία μας. Αν ακολουθήσουμε αυτά τα παραδείγματα τότε βρισκόμαστε πραγματικά στο σωστό μονοπάτι που οδηγεί στη σωτηρία της ψυχής μας. Οποία ευλογία για όλους μας...
